We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of the business-type activities and the major fund of Marin Healthcare District as of June 30, 2006 and for the fiscal year then ended, as listed in the table of contents. These basic financial statements are the responsibility of Marin Healthcare District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards, and the State Controller's Minimum Audit Requirements for California Special Districts. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the basic financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the basic financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall basic financial statement presentation. Marin Healthcare District MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS June 30, 2006

This section of Marin Healthcare District's (the District's) basic financial statements presents management's overview and analysis of the financial activities of the organization for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006. We encourage the reader to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the financial statements as a whole.

Introduction to the Basic Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the District's audited financial statements, which are comprised of the basic financial statements. This annual report is prepared in accordance with the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements—and Management's Discussion and Analysis—for States and Local Governments.

The required financial statements include the Statement of Net Assets; the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets; and the Statement of Cash Flows. Notes to the financial statements, supplementary detail and/or statistical information, and this summary support these statements. All sections must be considered together to obtain a complete understanding of the financial picture of the organization.

Statement of Net Assets:

This statement includes all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting as of the statement date. The difference between the two classifications is represented as "Net Assets"; this section of the statement identifies major categories of restrictions on these assets and reflects the overall financial position of the organization as a whole.

Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets:

This statement presents the revenues earned and the expenses incurred during the year using the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis, all increases or decreases in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event occurs, regardless of the timing of the cash flow. Consequently revenues and/or expenditures reported during this fiscal year may result in changes to cash flows in a future period.

Statement of Cash Flows:

This statement reflects inflows and outflows of cash, summarized by operating, capital, financing and investing activities. The direct method was used to prepare this information, which means that gross rather than net amounts were presented for the year's activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements:

This additional information is essential to a full understanding of the data reported in the basic financial statements.

The District is a political sub-division of the State of California. It is the lessor of the Marin General Hospital Facility and is governed by a Board of Directors.

Analytical Overview

A. Business-type Activities

Summary

Total assets of the District have decreased this year by \$1,191,338, primarily related to current year depreciation charges on capital assets.

Liabilities have decreased this year by \$979,591, as a result of the reduction of deferred lease revenue.

Unrestricted Net Assets have increased \$808,046 due to the reduction in the amount invested in capital assets. The overall change to Net Assets is a decrease of \$211,747, resulting in a June 30, 2006 deficit of \$125,747.

Debt Administration

The District does not use debt to finance operations.

Economic Outlook and Major Initiatives

Economic factors do not have a direct influence on the District's budget. The current lease requires Marin General Hospital Corporation to pay \$1,500,000 of rent annually irrespective of the hospital's net earnings. Similarly, the litigation settlement requires a set annual payment irrespective of economic conditions. As of June 30, 2006, settlement discussions were ongoing and a settlement agreement was reached at the September 12, 2006 District Board meeting with a formal agreement entered into on October 4, 2006. In the settlement agreement it was noted the lease with the Marin General Hospital Corporation (MGHC) will be terminated no later than July 1, 2010. This will have a large impact on the District, but the size of the impact is not currently determinable.

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

Marin Healthcare District (the District) is a political subdivision of the State of California; it is the lessor of the Marin General Hospital Facility and is governed by a Board of Directors. The District operated the hospital facility until December 1, 1985, at which time the District reorganized in compliance with local hospital district law of the State of California and agreed to lease the hospital facility to Marin General Hospital Corporation (the Hospital Corporation), a California nonprofit public benefit corporation.

The lessee is a general acute-care hospital located in Marin County that provides both inpatient and outpatient healthcare services. The Hospital Corporation inpatient facilities consist of medical-surgical, pediatrics, maternity, nursery, intensive care, coronary, psychology, radiology and laboratory care services.

As further described in Note 5, the District leases the hospital facility to the Hospital Corporation for a term of 30 years. During the term of this lease, the District derives substantially all of its revenue from the lease obligation.

The District incurs operating losses due to excess operating expenses (principally depreciation) over the annual rent of \$1,500,000. The depreciation expense is significant in the early years of the lease, due to the shorter life of equipment. In September 1999, the parties entered into a settlement agreement whereby the District receives \$150,000 annually from the Hospital Corporation to cover administrative expenses. Commencing in 2005 the amount paid to the District will increase annually by a Consumer Price Index factor with a minimum of 3% and a maximum of 5%.

In addition to providing oversight of the Hospital Corporation's compliance with the Lease Agreement, the District provides a community forum for discussion of local healthcare issues, promotes healthcare services in the community, and acts as an advocate for the public for quality, reasonably priced, healthcare services.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Entity

The District is the only entity included in these financial statements.

B. Basis of Presentation and Accounting

The activities of the District are accounted for as an Enterprise Fund. Enterprise funds are accounted for on the flow of economic resources measurement focus and use the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred. In compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 20, the District has chosen to apply all applicable GASB pronouncements and all Financial Accounting Standards Board Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless they conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements.

NOTE 2 - <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (continued)

B. Basis of Presentation and Accounting (concluded)

Proprietary fund operating revenues, such as charges for services, result from exchange transactions associated with the principal activity of the fund. Exchange transactions are those in which each party receives and gives up essentially equal values. Non-operating revenues, such as subsidies and investment earnings, result from non-exchange transactions or ancillary activities. The District may fund programs with a combination of cost-reimbursement grants, categorical block grants, and general revenues. Thus, both restricted and unrestricted net assets may be available to finance program expenditures. The District's policy is to first apply restricted grant resources to such programs, followed by general revenues if necessary.

C. Budgetary Accounting

The District's procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements are as follows:

The Management Finance and Audit Committee submit a proposed operating budget to the District's full Board for the fiscal year commencing the following July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenses and the means of financing them. The Management Finance and Audit Committee and full District board are open to public comment at scheduled board meetings. The budget is legally enacted through a District Board action.

D. Use of Estimates

The basic financial statements have been prepared in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles, and as such, include amounts based on informed estimates and judgments of management with consideration given to materiality. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

E. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and investments are used in preparing the statement of cash flows because these assets are highly liquid and are expended to liquidate liabilities arising during the year.

F. Property, Plant, and Equipment

Property, plant, and equipment is recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets. Depreciation expense was \$1,020,119 for the year ended June 30, 2006. The threshold for capitalizing capital expenses is \$5,000.

G. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the District carries commercial insurance.

NOTE 2 - <u>SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES</u> (concluded)

H. Deferred Revenue-Lease

Deferred revenue represents capital expenditures by the Hospital Corporation in excess of the current commitment, which will be recognized as rental revenue in future years.

I. Revenue Recognition

The District recognizes lease income and reimbursement of operating expenses when earned and paid.

NOTE 3 - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

Cash balances from all funds are combined and invested to the extent possible pursuant to the District Board approved Investment Policy and Guidelines and State Government Code.

California Law requires banks and savings and loan institutions to pledge government securities with a market value of 110% of the District's cash on deposit or first trust deed mortgage notes with a value of 150% of the deposit as collateral for these deposits. Under California Law this collateral is held in the District's name and places the District ahead of general creditors of the institution.

<u>Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits:</u>

In the case of deposits, this is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. As of June 30, 2006, \$63,812 of the District's bank balance of \$163,812 was exposed to custodial credit risk because it was uninsured and collateralized with securities held in the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent, but not in the District's name.

Authorized Investments

In accordance with Section 53601 of the California Government Code, the District may invest in the following types of investments:

Securities of the U.S. Government, or its agencies Negotiable Certificates of Deposits Local Agency Investment Fund (State Pool) Deposits

The District's investments are carried at fair value instead of cost, as required by U.S. generally accepted accounting principles. The District adjusts the carrying value of its investments to reflect their fair value at each fiscal year end only if material, and it includes the effects of these adjustments in income for that fiscal year.

NOTE 3 - <u>CASH AND INVESTMENTS</u> (concluded)

The District places certain funds with the State of California's Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). The District is a voluntary participant in LAIF, which is regulated by California Government Code Section 16429 under the oversight of the Treasurer of the State of California and the Pooled Money Investment Board. The State Treasurer's office pools these funds with those of other governmental agencies in the state and invests the cash. The fair value of the District's investment in this pool is reported in the accompanying financial statements based upon the District's pro-rata share of the fair value provided by LAIF for the entire LAIF portfolio (in relation to the amortized cost of that portfolio). The monies held in the pooled investment funds are not subject to categorization by risk category. The balance available for withdrawal is based on the accounting records maintained by LAIF, which are recorded on the amortized cost basis. Funds are accessible and transferable to the master account with twenty-four hours notice. Financial statements for LAIF can be obtained from the California State Treasurer's Office: State Treasurer's Office, 915 Capitol Mall, Suite 110, Sacramento, CA 95814.

The management of the State of California Pooled Money Investment Account has indicated to the District that as of June 30, 2006 the carrying amount of the pool was \$63,337,959,989 and the estimated market value of the pool (including accrued interest) was \$63,616,592,927. The District's proportionate share of that value is \$258,599. Included in LAIF's investment portfolio are certain derivative securities or similar products in the form of structured notes, totaling \$225,000,000 and asset-backed securities totaling \$1,400,919,000. LAIF's (and the District's) exposure to risk (credit, market or legal) is not currently available.

The District's property, plant and equipment are leased to and used exclusively, by the Hospital Corporation. Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2006 was \$1,020,119.

NOTE 5 - LEASE OF MARIN HEALTHCARE DISTRICT FACILITY

A. Annual Rental Payments

Effective December 1, 1985, the District leased the Marin General Hospital facility to the Hospital Corporation for a term of 30 years pursuant to Section 32126 of the Local Hospital District Law. Per the amended lease agreement dated August 25, 1987, rent is due in annual installments of \$1,500,000.

The annual rent payments comprise capital expenditures and a \$125,000 minimum cash payment. The minimum cash payment, which is payable in quarterly installments, increases annually by 5% throughout the lease term. The lessee has satisfied this provision of the lease for the year ended June 30, 2006.

Under the terms of the lease, the minimum cash components of the annual rental payments from the Hospital Corporation for the next five fiscal years and thereafter are as follows:

Due to the significant capital investment required for the hospital modernization program completed in June 1989, the Hospital Corporation's rental payment commitment for capital expenditures due under the entire lease has been satisfied. The advanced capital commitment (including the excess capital commitment) has been recorded as deferred revenue. As of June 30, 2006, the total deferred lease revenue was \$10,699,614.

The deferred lease revenue will be amortized over the remaining term of the lease ending no later than July 1, 2010 as noted in the settlement agreement dated October 4, 2006.

B. <u>Capital Improvement Payments</u>

In addition to the capital rental obligation described under annual rental payments, the lease agreement requires the Hospital Corporation to make minimum annual capital expenditures (buildings and equipment) during the lease term. The obligation was approximately \$3,020,850 for the year ended June 30, 2006 and will increase thereafter for inflation (not to exceed 5% per year). These assets automatically revert to the District upon termination of the lease. Accordingly, these assets are a part of the Hospital Corporation's financial statements, and are not included in the accompanying financial statements. Many of these assets will revert without payment by the District; however, reversion of certain assets may also include liabilities (including required payments by the District) related to such assets. The lessee has satisfied this provision of the lease for the year ended June 30, 2006.

NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Under its lease obligations, the Hospital Corporation is currently paying some of the operating expenses incurred by the District. Examples of expenses paid include supplies, telephone charges, office equipment, and business insurance premiums. Total expenses paid by the Hospital Corporation on behalf of the District for the year ended June 30, 2006 were approximately \$11,000. In addition, the Hospital Corporation paid the District's Directors' and Officers' liability insurance for the policy year ended March 25, 2006. The Hospital Corporation also provides office space for the District.

NOTE 7 - <u>NET ASSETS</u>

Net Assets is the excess of all the District's assets over all its liabilities, regardless of fund. Net Assets are divided into three captions under GASB Statement 34. These captions apply only to Net Assets, which is determined only at the Government-wide level, and are described below:

Invested in Capital, net of related debt describes the portion of Net Assets that is represented by the current net book value of the District's capital assets, less the outstanding balance of any debt issued to finance these assets.

Restricted described the portion of Net Assets that is restricted as to use by the terms and conditions of agreements with outside parties, governmental regulations, laws, or other restrictions which the District cannot unilaterally alter. These principally include developer fees received for use on capital projects, debt service requirements, and redevelopment funds restricted to low and moderate income purposes. The District has no restricted Net Assets.

Unrestricted describes the portion of Net Assets that is not restricted to use.

NOTE 8 - NET ASSET DEFICIT

As reported in Note 11, the District subsequent to the year end sold land owned by the District. The proceeds and related gain from the sale of the land will more than offset the net asset deficit of \$125,747 at June 30, 2006.

NOTE 9 - DUE TO SUTTER VNA AND HOSPICE

In 2004, Marin Home Care Corporation (MHC Corporation) sold its assets to Sutter VNA and Hospice. In February 2005, the District received a \$225,000 check from Sutter VNA and Hospice relating to the District's reversionary interest in MHC Corporation. Per the District's attorney, control of MHC Corporation has to be obtained by the District prior to the District having a claim to this \$225,000 asset of MHC Corporation. Accordingly, the proceeds of the payment to the District have been classified as a liability due to Sutter VNA and Hospice.

NOTE 10 - CONTINGENT LIABILITIES & SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The District is involved in various claims and litigation arising in the ordinary course of business. Pursuant to the settlement agreement dated September 20, 1999, the District and the Hospital Corporation settled the claims arising from disputes as to the parties' respective rights and obligations under the lease and administration agreement. Commencing with the year beginning January 1, 1999, and for each year until the termination of the lease, the Hospital Corporation will pay to the District annually the sum of \$150,000 in equal quarterly installments, commencing January 1, 2000. As of December 1, 2005, this payment will be increased based on a percentage equal to the Consumer Price Index, not to exceed 5% or be less than 3% of the annual payment of the preceding year.

On June 30, 2005, the Hospital Corporation filed a complaint against the District in Superior Court, Marin County, seeking declaration that the District is obligated to perform and pay for seismic upgrades required by law. The complaint also seeks a declaration that the required seismic upgrades would interfere with the purpose of the lease, which is to provide a hospital facility. The District filed a cross-complaint seeking declaration that the Hospital Corporation is obligated to perform the seismic upgrades, and a declaration defining the rights and duties of the parties in the event of a lease termination. Management's representation is that the District paid approximately \$280,000 for seismic study expenses in the 2005 fiscal year, and per a signed agreement with the Hospital Corporation, the Hospital Corporation has agreed to reimburse all such expenses up to \$500,000. On November 28, 2005, the District amended its cross-complaint to allege that the Hospital Corporation breached the lease by failing to upgrade the hospital facility. On October 4, 2006, the parties to the litigation entered into a Settlement Agreement. District management, based on the opinion of legal counsel, is of the opinion that the dispute was fully resolved and the litigation subsequently dismissed.

NOTE 11 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The District Board approved an Agreement for Purchase and Sale of the land at 1260 S. Eliseo, Greenbrae, on October 10, 2006. The land will be sold to the Marin Community Clinic for \$1,529,000. The building is owned by Mervin L. Grais and Annine G. Untiedt, as Trustees and they wish to give the building to the Marin Community Clinic. Escrow has not yet closed; the Marin Community Clinic has asked for an extension of the closing date.
